The trouble with wanting to tell any story that's been told and retold a million times, is figuring out your angle; not just what it is, but why it is.

The idea to combine *Robin Hood* with *A Midsummer Night's Dream* was one I stumbled upon when I was talking to a local Shakespeare company about how *Midsummer* is a timeless and true classic, but also perhaps the most overdone play in the entire western canon. Somewhere in there a light bulb went off and it hit me that maybe by combining two such tried and tired classics, I could trip my way into something that, if not exactly new, would at least be novel. When I started working on the piece, I originally thought it would be a pretty straightforward adaptation, more a directorial concept than an actual new script, but with each draft I found that more and more of my poetry was lacing its way into the piece, with Shakespeare's words often inspiring my own, and then being replaced by ones more appropriate to my characters. Now I jokingly tell people I am collaborating with Shakespeare because sometimes that's how it feels. There have even been times when I've found myself speaking out loud to him.

But to what end, you may ask? For the sheer joy of it. We love *Midsummer* and *Robin Hood* for, I think, similar reasons: they are both outlandish and often hilarious stories about freedom, about people who run to nature for solace or protection and in the depths of the woods discover who they are, who they can be. They are both jubilant, joyful, celebratory tales about being human, idealistic, driven by romance and passion and profound senses of Right and Wrong, and they are also both dark and uncanny at times. They are stories about seeking to make whole again, a community which has been split by those petty and greedy parts of ourselves that aren't admirable but are certainly human.

Stuart Bousel (director/writer) is a San Francisco based playwright and director. He most recently adapted *A Room With A View* for **Actors Ensemble's** summer 2023 production and directed *Cymbeline* at Berkeley Shakes. He is currently on the staff for The EXIT Theatre, and freelance writes for the Petaluma Argus-Courier. **www.stuartbousel.com**.

Set aside like so many projects from that time, I am beyond excited to find it surfacing again, at a time when stories about being part of something, doing right, and forgiving your foes, feel most needed.
